#### A Few Good Words

### Reimagine -> Reconnect -> Reinvest

Ecclesia Reformata Semper Reformanda. That Latin phrase roughly translates, "The Reformed Church is always reforming." The famous twentieth century Swiss theologian Karl Barth popularized the phrase, but it predates him by hundreds of years.

The Reformed Church is really a family of denominations, including the Presbyterians, who trace their roots back to John Calvin and his contemporaries during the Protestant Reformation. The idea embodied in this important phrase is deeply theological and also quite practical. It assumes rightly that the Church is never perfect this side of heaven. It suggests that there is always room to grow and develop. And it reveals this deep truth: the only constant in this life is not the Church; it's change.

In the year 2020, change has certainly been constant! The people we were, back in February would hardly recognize the people we are, here in November — and not just because our faces are all behind masks! So much has changed about the ways that we have had to do ministry at Alamance. Live-stream only and outdoor services, constant Zoom meetings, temperature checks at the doors, the staff working remotely, uploading videos, phone calls instead of visits ... it's just all been too much change, too quickly!

This leaves us feeling as if right is left, up is down, and one step forward is two steps back. And now, of all things, it is time for Alamance to start its stewardship campaign, the one we used to hold in the spring! Your Session, at the recommendation of the Administrative

Ministry Team, has decided to realign our fiscal year with the calendar year. Going forward, our annual budget will now run January to December instead of July to June. This might turn out to be a welcome change, but it does mean our stewardship push will now happen at a different time of year.

The Stewardship Team has chosen as our theme for 2020: Reimagine -> **Reconnect** -> **Reinvest**. The reasons are simple. During the COVID-19 pandemic, we have had to reimagine the ways we do ministry at Alamance. This Reformed church has been reforming its ministry to meet brand new challenges, and we still have more reimagining to do. In the meantime, we know that many of our dear friends have felt isolated and cut off from the community. We want this stewardship season and the new year to be a time when we <u>reconnect</u> to each other and to God. And of course, we want this to be a time when we reinvest ourselves in Alamance.

What we have done these last eight months is far from perfect, and there is always more we could do. But I will say that I am proud of the ways that our church has met the changes and challenges of 2020. We have learned to reach out to each other in new ways. Many of us have tried new things we never thought we would. Some of us have worked tirelessly to help our neighbors, and the service to the community that is the hallmark of our congregation continues in whatever way it can. (continued on page 2)

- 4. On www.alamancechurch.org, the *Worship Live Streaming* page has all the recorded services still available and options for not-yet-happened services so you can log in on *those* Sundays at **10 a.m.**, in real time.



#### Designated Mission for November: The Shepherd Center of Uganda

The Mission Team has designated the Shepherd Center in Kabale, Uganda to receive the November Special Offering for Missions.

The Shepherd Center is a non-profit organization founded in 2007 by Patrick Tushabomwe, to rehabilitate street children in Kabale. Patrick was a street child himself. Patrick used money from his first job to provide food, clothing, and hygiene items to boys whose families cannot afford to provide basic care to them.

The Shepherd Center (TSC) serves 55 boys at present: 25 live in the Center and 30 live with family members. Those in the center receive shelter, food, education, clothing, medical care, and love. Those at home are provided education, clothing, food (as needed), and medical care — so that they can stay with their families who do not otherwise have financial means to support the children.

TSC works hand-in-hand with families and community after children are resettled. This raises awareness that these children exist and that they want a future that does not end on the streets.

TSC continues to organize outreaches in which other street children are counseled, encouraged, and given basic necessities like food and clothing. It is the prayer of TSC to expand so that children remaining on the streets are reached, loved, and provided for as Christ has called us to look after these little ones.

#### Christmas in Kabale

Every year, TSC holds a Christmas party for the boys and their families, and gives gifts to each boy. It is amazing how much \$48 can buy in Uganda!

Here is a list of items that each of the 55 boys will receive, and the cost in U.S. dollars:

- 1. Two t-shirts \$2.75
- 2. Two pairs of shorts \$7.25
- 3. Two pairs of jeans \$7.25
- 4. Two buttoned shirts \$3.55
- 5. One sweatshirt \$2.80
- 6. One pair of shoes \$6.15
- 7. One pair of sandals \$1.95
- 8. One belt \$1.10
- 9. Two pairs of socks \$1.10
- 10. Two pairs of underwear \$2.25
- 11. Two undershirts \$1.70
- 12. One handkerchief \$.30
- 13. Petroleum jelly \$1.15
- 14. Soap \$1.70
- 15. Pocket money \$2

The first six items are secondhand; all other items are purchased brand new. Cost for the party itself breaks down to about \$6 for each boy. \$48 per child pays for the gifts and the party.

Sending money so that TSC can purchase these items in Uganda is not only more cost-efficient than collecting and sending items ourselves, but it also helps small business owners in Kabale who were shut down during the pandemic.

#### COVID-19 in Uganda

When COVID-19 was just hitting and Uganda was under a very restricting lockdown, several generous donors sent funds to TSC specifically for COVID-19 relief. TSC used some of those funds to provide food supplements to families of boys who stay off-site. The gifts of rice, posho (corn flour that is a staple in the Ugandan diet), beans, etc. were a huge blessing to all who received them.

As those designated funds were used up, month by month, the staff decided to take a different approach with some of older boys who live with their families. They decided to use some of the funds as start-up capital for small businesses of some kind — so that the boys would have something to keep them occupied as they wait for schools to reopen, as well as help them contribute to their families financially.

TSC had individual meetings with the boys to discuss what business ideas could work for them and their families. They were all thrilled with the idea and happy to get started! In fact, some of our boys had already started doing something to earn some money, so we came alongside them to help improve or increase their capabilities.

Boys had a range of proposals including selling charcoal or potatoes, making street food, and even rearing animals. Each boy has a staff member assigned to him as an advisor. TSC believes this is a very beneficial exercise for all involved.

Got a coffee lover in your life? Why not buy some brew from **Cafe Feminino**, an agency that supports women coffee growers around the world and roasts its beans in Raleigh? Or buy a mug from **A Special Blend**, a coffee shop that provides jobs for folks with disabilities.

You could buy locally sourced candles, lip balm, and hand lotion from the women of **Benevolence Farm;** or send a gift-basket of home baked goodies to out-of-town friends and family from **Homeboy Industries**. Each of those ministries offers guidance and job training for

folks who have been incarcerated, working to ensure an end to recidivism, and to reunite families.

Of course, you could always show some APC love by purchasing one of our new long sleeve tees or sweatshirts. Or buy a hand-felted, unique creche or tree ornament from our friends Jeff, Anne, Ben, and Jared up the road at

Peacehaven Community Farm. Not only does Peacehaven help APC with our Food Pantry, providing up to 15 pounds of food a week for our clients; they also host housing, job training, and community life for friends living with disabilities in Gibsonville.

And don't forget your Honor Cards! Every year we sell special Christmas Cards created by local artist William Mangum to support the work of **Greensboro Urban Ministry**, where we also regularly serve meals through Potter's House. G.U.M. offers food, shelter, and stability for those experiencing homelessness throughout Greensboro. We love partnering with them to show our love of God through love of neighbor.

Of course, gifts aren't the only way we prepare to celebrate this most sacred season of our calendar year. Practicing gratitude and sharing kindness are free ways to spread the message of thanks and joy that permeate the next two months. Though we may not be able to meet indoors for some time, our faith is bigger than any building! And we certainly don't need to meet in a sanctuary to model Christ's love to the world through our actions everyday!

### Xpujil Update from Todd Luke

Dear Friends,

I will be back in Xpujil to meet with all our cistern owner partners after Thanksgiving.

All over the Calakmul region, entire families work so hard, trying to survive. By God's grace, humans can work and bring in the harvest. Work is not a necessary evil. It's a valuable part of God's health plan for us and all of creation. We do well to be mindful of work's sacred origin. Whether we go to Xpujil in person or contribute a portion of the fruit of our labor so that others can work together for God's sake to build cisterns, God uses work to bring health to individuals, families, and communities.

COVID-19 in Mexico: Mexico's COVID alert system goes from Red (total lockdown), Orange (small-scale partial reopening), Yellow (medium scale reopening), to Green (back to normal).

Campeche is the only state in Mexico currently in phase Green. Churches are open for worship on Sundays. Folks wear masks inside stores. Xpujil is as busy as I've ever seen it. Businesses are open. The soccer field grass is green and well-manicured. Nevertheless, all sports leagues are suspended.

Outside of Xpujil, agricultural activity is buzzing.

All schools are closed. There is no online schooling. Teachers send assignments to families in PDF files sent to cell phones. Students copy the assignments onto paper and then do the homework. Every couple of weeks, students submit stacks of homework to those who will deliver it to teachers working from home — several hours away from Xpujil. The government installed free public access Wi-Fi hotspots in the villages to facilitate this process. Not every family has a cell phone in the Calakmul region.

If you feel a nudge to join or organize a work team with 3-5 people in 2021, let me know. We are forming teams for Monday-Sunday trips because so many families in Calakmul need a year-round reliable clean water source.

Please continue to pray for all of our partners in the US and Mexico.

# APC Food Pantry Is Looking for Families!

The APC Food Pantry has continued to distribute food to families who need some assistance, on **each Saturday** throughout this long pandemic. We do not ask about your circumstances — your privacy is maintained.

Family size, names and date of birth of all family members, and family income information is collected; per federal guidelines that we must follow. You can check the family income qualifications based on family size to determine your eligibility, in the table below.

It is easy to sign up to receive the free food. Call the church office (336-697-0488 ext. 111) on **Monday morning**, beginning at **8:30 a.m.**; and leave a message that you would like to receive food.

Someone from the Food Pantry will return your call to let you know if you are on the list for pick-up that coming Saturday. Food is distributed on a "first called, first served" basis. We can serve up to 30 families each week. Once the list is filled, we must turn families away and ask them to call again the following week.

Once confirmed that you are on the list for that week, you then drive around to Brown Fellowship Hall on **Saturday morning**, provide your name — and food is loaded into your car by volunteers. You do not need to exit your car; there is no contact with others. Food Pantry volunteers all wear face masks and use hand sanitizer.

The kind of food typically distributed includes some frozen meats, some fresh produce, breads and desserts, and canned and dry staple foods.

The amount of food distributed varies by family size and varies somewhat each week depending on what food we have on hand.

Typically, a family of four receives about 100 pounds of food.

Families are eligible to receive food once per month for six months as long as income level eligibility is maintained.

The APC Food Pantry is here to serve ALL in our community. If you could use a little extra help, or if you know a friend or neighbor who needs assistance, please pass on this information; so that we can connect people with free, nutritious food.

## From the APC Food Pantry Team:

"Each week we serve 30 hungry families — we have seen an increase, with more families in need of food, in the last couple of months.

"During the month of October, we served 139 different families in our community.

"This year, as we have done in the past, we plan to give turkeys to our 30 families on **Saturday**, **November 14**.

"The Food Pantry would appreciate your help in donating any of the following items that are also part of a traditional Thanksgiving meal: green beans (canned), candied yams (canned),

instant mashed potatoes, canned gravy or gravy mix, stuffing, cranberry sauce.

"There will be a container outside Brown Fellowship Hall for you to deposit your goodies. Members of the Food Pantry Team will schlep them into the building on your behalf since the Child Development Center uses Brown Fellowship Hall as classroom space, entry to that space is not permitted on weekdays.

#### Potter's House

Since July of 2004, APC has served supper to hungry guests at the Greensboro Urban Ministry's Potter's House on the **third Saturday of each odd-numbered month.** Remaining 2020 date: **November 21.** 

This essential local hunger-relief ministry is allowed to operate during pandemic restrictions.

As of this writing, G.U.M. has implemented physical distancing measures in its dining room. Servers are required to wear masks and gloves. Guests are instructed to wash their hands before being seated (and are monitored as they do so).

The work is intense, but not long. Arrive at **6 p.m**. to set up for the meal. Serve food from **7-7:45 p.m**. We clean up and are out the door by **8:15 p.m**. most usually.

Your donation of home-made desserts are welcomed. (Cakes, bars, and cookies are the easiest to serve, and for guests to eat. Pies are tricksy to serve, very messy to eat.)

#### APC Food Pantry Continues to Safely Distribute Food

APC will continue to operate the Food Pantry for the foreseeable future, unless required to stop by federal, state, or county government. Our pantry works under precautions recommended during COVID-19 restrictions, including pre-packing food bags and delivering them to clients in a car line.

Once each month, we pick up food from Second Harvest Food Bank in Winston-Salem. Every **Wednesday**, volunteers pack grocery bags and put them in carts for the week's guests.

#### Pandemic Procedures

Once the COVID-19 pandemic arrived, the APC Food Pantry team was in a quandary about how to continue to distribute food, when even more families would need it; while still keeping our volunteers safe.

Working with Second Harvest Food Bank, we developed new processes to do just that. One of the important changes is that — instead of having clients fill out paperwork in their cars — now a Food Pantry volunteer calls the clients to verify all needed information over the phone, earlier in the week.

When a client arrives to pick up food on a Saturday morning, they stay in the car and provide their name to a masked volunteer, who maintains a safe, six-foot distance. Once verified, masked volunteers load up the car with the food. There

is no physical contact with the clients.

In preparation for the food distribution, all volunteers wear masks and use hand sanitizer, before doing the prep work to divide up food and load up the shopping carts that are pushed out to clients' cars.

The team still gathers in a circle to pray before we begin distribution, but they do not hold hands, and they stay six feet apart from one another.

These well-thought-out policies have allowed this important ministry to continue to serve hungry families.

The Food Pantry can always use more **Saturday morning** volunteers to help with distribution (**9-11:30 a.m.**). If you would like to help, visit <a href="http://signup.com/go/h2b6xy">http://signup.com/go/h2b6xy</a> to sign up for a date.

Sign up as often or as infrequently as you want, but do, please, sign up rather than just showing up. Kris Levine, our Volunteer Coordinator, needs to know how many volunteers are coming ahead of time, so she can reach out to others if there are not enough people. When people just show up, they may find there are too many people already helping, and not feel useful.

The brand-new new *Little Free Food Pantry* (located by the Pavilion, behind Brown Fellowship Hall) is ready for use.


